



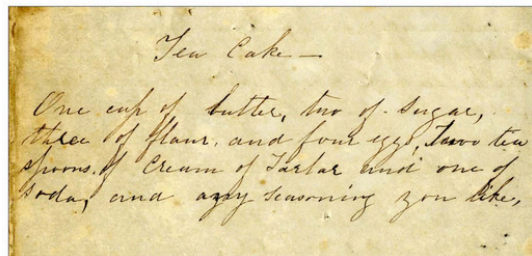
Territorial Tallahassee Tea Cakes

Recipe from notebook circa 1852 belonging to Mary Simpson Brown Archer containing handwritten recipes for desserts, pickles, medicinal remedies, and other preparations. Mary was the daughter of Florida Governor Thomas Brown (1849-1853).

Brown constructed Brown's Inn in 1834, located on the west side of Adams St. between Pensacola and Lafayette streets. It was known as The City Hotel (1839) and The Adelphi (1840). Mary Archer, operated the establishment as the City Hotel from 1870 to about 1874, when it was taken over by Tallahassee merchant William P. Slusser. It later became the Morgan Hotel (named changed in September 1884) and was destroyed by fire in 1886.

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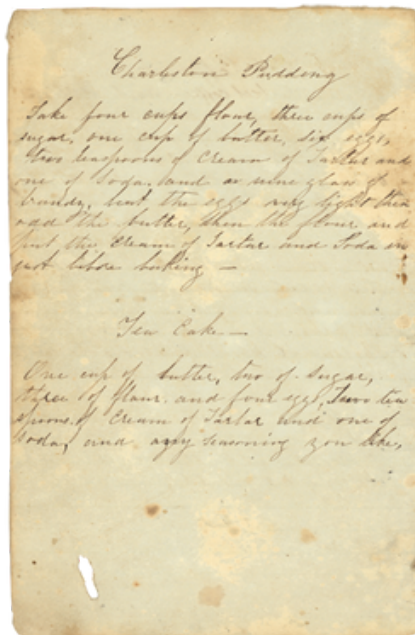
Tea Cake
